MISSION REPORT NO. 11-327

DATE: 2 May 1945 (GCT).

OBSERVATIONS: The crew of plane #616 over FALA ISLAND, TRUK ATOLL, at 0215022 observed 2 airborne objects at their 11,000 foot altitude changing from a cherry red to an orange, and to a white light which would die out and then become charry red again. These objects were out on either wing and not within range of caliber .50 machine gums. Both followed the B-24 thru all types of evasive action. A B-24 took a course for CUAN and one of the pursuers dropped off at 0219002 after accompanying the B-di for an hour. The other continued to follow, never approaching closer than 1000 yards and speeding up when the B-24 tent thru the plouds to everyo on the other side shead of the B-24. In daylight it was such to be bright silver in color. As the B-24 let down at GUAM, the pursue took a course of 350 degrees at 15,000 feet to 20,000 feet altitude at 0221302. One B-21 encountered eight intense flames light green in color, one of which burst and hume at 5,000 feet at 0210132. There was no trail or warning until the actual burst. A B-24 reported 9 to 10 red tracertype trails of fire up to 5,000 feet. They came in pairs and one pair came within 50 to 100 yards of the tail of the B-2; at 021010%. SUMMARY OF INCIDENT:

The crow of plane #516 over FALA ISLAND, TRUK ATOLL, at 021802Z observed 2 airborne objects at their 11,000 foot altitude changing from a cherry red to an orange, and to a white light which would die out and then become cherry red again. These objects were out on either wing and not within range of caliber .50 machine guns. Both followed the B-24 thru all types of evasive action. A B-24 took a course for GUAM and one of the pursuers dropped off at 021900Z after accompanying the B-24, for an hour. The other continued to follow, never approaching closer than 1000 yards and speeding up when the B-24 went thru the clouds to emerge on the other side ahead of the B-24. In daylight it was seen to be bright silver in color. As the B-24 let down at GUAM, the pursuer took a course of 330 degrees at 15,000 feet to 20,000 feet altitude at 022130Z. One B-24 encountered eight intense flames light green in color, man one of which burst and hung at 5,000 feet at 021013Z. There was not trail or warning until the actual brust. A B-24 reported 9 to 10 red tracer type trails of fire up to 5.000 feet. They came in pairs and one pair came within 50 to 100 yards of the tail of the B-24 at 021010Z. Source of each pair was at a different location.
